PITCH IN: River Cleanup

On Saturday, April 16 -- just before Earth Day -- Norwalk Land Trust and the Norwalk River Watershed Association partner a BIG cleanup between the Route 136 and Route 95 bridges -- both onshore and in the River. We gather by the Aquarium pavilion, opposite the north entrance, starting at 9:30AM. Come on down!

Kayakers (dry suits required; the water is still dangerously cold in April) can park and put-in at Veteran's Park. Canoeists will help the kayakers collect trash and debris from the high-water-mark along the riverbank, and then ferry it to shore. Landlubber volunteers



will collect, separate and dispose of the material. We think we can retrieve 100% of accumulated floating debris! A historic occasion, indeed.


Enthusiastic cooperation and leadership from The Small Boat Shop in South Norwalk, combined with offers to help from Save The Sound, the Neighborhood Improvement section of Norwalk's Redevelopment Agency, and others, make this a very promising venture.

The Norwalk Land Trust's 27 properties include several streams and brooks which feed the Norwalk, Five Mile and other rivers, in addition to replenishing aquifers and providing wildlife habitat. THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

NEWACQUISITION: BETTS BROOK



This has been an exciting year for the Norwalk Land Trust. After 4 1/2 years we were able to complete the \$4,500,000 campaign to purchase and complete the Farm Creek Preserve. This campaign was nationally recognized in Forbes Magazine in June and the city of Norwalk put the campaign over the top with a grant from the city's Open Space Fund for \$155,000 by the unanimous vote of the Common Council on September 28, 2010. There were many pieces that came together for this success story: Chuck Schoendorf, a concerned Norwalk resident, who purchased the property and held it until the Land Trust could raise the necessary funds to purchase it; Pete Scull, the Chairman of the Campaign for Farm Creek, who organized and chaired weekly meetings for four and one half years; the Conservation Fund, a nationally recognized preservationist charity, who loaned the Land Trust \$2,000,000 at below market rates and with liberal repayment terms; and, there were over 1000 local contributors who donated over \$3,500,000 and the public grants from the state, the city and the Sixth Taxing District who provided the remaining \$1,000,000.

However, the most important piece of this success story was the individuals of the Campaign for Farm Creek and the Board of the Land Trust. Without their dedication and tireless devotion to the cause, it never would have happened. The City of Norwalk will forever be blessed with this natural treasure preserved.

Coming off this great achievement, The Board of the Norwalk Land Trust eagerly intends to keep the momentum going. While we do not anticipate any immediate campaigns such as Farm Creek, the Board is moving enthusiastically toward improving the stewardship of our properties, increasing and expanding our education programs for the schools; creating nature tours, bird watching and other events on our properties. In addition the Land Trust will actively seek partnerships with neighborhood associations and environmental groups to further our mission and goals. The city has approached us to preserve and protect city owned land through conservation easements and for the Land Trust to mitigate and steward such properties for the benefits of the adjoining neighbors and the residents of Norwalk.

For all of you members, we thank you for your support. We invite you to visit our properties, participate in our events and give us your input as to how the Board of Directors can do a better job. We need volunteers and welcome your participation in all our activities. D. Seeley Hubbard President. In December, NLT added its 27th property -- 12-1/2 Allen Road, an important segment of Betts Brook, which feeds the Norwalk River, forms the property's western border. Nearly an acre of mixed woods, meadow and wetlands was donated to the Trust by Frederick Canevari and Venke Vey Canevari and the Betts Brook portion, running along the western edge of the property, detours around Woods Pond and spreads out in the marshy woods below. More and more of Norwalk Land Trust's properties are bringing important watercourses into the Trust's stewardship. "Already we steward portions of Village Creek, Five Mile River, Stony Brook which feeds the Saugatuck, and Betts Brook," says Stewardship Chairman John Moeling. In addition, the waters and wetlands provide important habitats and subsurface water collection to replenish Norwalk's aquifers."

NEW: YOUTH STEWARDSHIP PROGRAM

For two years, NLT directors have worked with City elementary-school teachers to present classroom information on the values to Norwalk of open, protected space in the City. Fourth grade kids from more than half our schools have been brought to NLT's Farm Creek Nature Preserve for personal tours of the shoreline habitat. Now Norwalk Land Trust is introducing a new program directed to teens.

The Young Stewards Program will host small groups of 13 to 17-year-olds who are interested in hands-on learning about the environment coupled with actual stewardship tasks like removal of invasive plants and vines, clearing of trails and watercourse, and planting of native species. The Land Trust provides instruction and supervision in cooperation with adult representatives of N.E.O.N. All tools and materials are supplied by NLT and "graduates" receive certificates of completion. Watch the NLT website for more info.

VOLUNTEERS MAKE THE DIFFERENCE

The spirit of volunteerism has been strong during our four year Campaign for Farm Creek Preserve. In fact, we never could have succeeded without many volunteers, their pro bono hours and in-kind gifts.



With 27 properties and approximately 100 acres of land under our care, the Norwalk Land Trust continually needs volunteers to achieve our mission of preserving land in its natural state for the benefit of future generations in Norwalk. We have a hard working board of directors, but the key to doing an even better job is finding volunteers who share our commitment and are willing to give a piece of their time and talent.

Our needs come in five categories:

<u>Stewardship</u> (out of doors, some heavy duty):

- Clean-ups, building trails, pruning, raking leaves, removing invasives
- Work with 'Young Stewards' volunteers

Education:

During the school year, we offer guided walks around the Farm Creek Preserve with a target ratio of one guide to six children. Material covered compliments the Norwalk Schools' 4th grade science curriculum, and occurs April through June and, September through November. We provide training.

- Field trip guide for school children
- Nature walks for adults on NLT properties with
 nature expert

Events:

We need help with coordinating and staffing events. Familiarity with Norwalk Land Trust helps, but NLT board member(s) are present as well.

Administrative (indoors):

No special skills needed for some tasks, computer and filing experience a plus for others:

- Help with mailings (newsletters, membership)
- Develop/update NLT property neighbor lists
- Help with fundraising tasks
- Telephone/email to alert neighbors of cleanups, meetings and other NLT events

Special Skills:

- Graphic artist to design/produce posters, postcard mailers, brochure, PowerPoint presentations, etc.
- Writers for newsletter articles and news releases
- Expertise in a natural science flora and fauna,
- marine biology, forestry, natural history
- Landscape maintenance

In the Special Skills category for example, **Emma Levine**, a graduating senior at Sacred Heart University, produced a video of our 4th grade school program and Discovery Day at Farm Creek for her class in Video Outreach. **Joe Alicastro**, her professor, gave his time to directing and polishing Emma's work.

Ryan Mange, a certified arborist with Almstead Tree and Shrub Care Co., is identifying the trees on the Farm Creek Preserve for future labeling. He will do an inventory of trees and other significant vegetation on the Hart Peninsula, the section of the Preserve restricted to wildlife.

Bob Kuchta, recently retired from the Stamford school system, made birdhouses to sell at Discovery Day and donated the proceeds to NLT's Farm Creek Campaign. Bob is also one of our field trip volunteers and re-mounted our Farm Creek sign.


